I went to Jerusalem to compare stories with Peter. (Galatians 1:18, The Message)

I love this story of Oswald Chambers from David McCasland's book, Abandoned to God. Oswald was anxiously preparing for his interview to be accepted into seminary but was stunned by their only question, "How and when were you converted?"

God has used that story to shape not just our individual lives but, perhaps more importantly, our collective lives as His children. The Bible is the most magnificent nonfiction story ever recorded.

"With many stories like these, he presented his message to them, fitting the stories to their experience and maturity. He was never without a story when he spoke. When he was alone with his disciples, he went over everything, sorting out the tangles, untying the knots" (Mark 4:33-34, The Message).

Another story involved a man lost; lost in alcohol and extramarital affairs. He said, "God found me at the bottom and set me on this new trail." He then thanked one of the men in the group that day for just

listening and mentoring him during that difficult time. I like hanging around real men who are now alive in Christ.

Can you imagine God telling us, "I know your story, and I will make it a part of My Story?" I was honored to be in the room that day, hearing how God changes lives. I don't get to do that daily, but I am working on it.
