With that in mind, can I get up in your business for a moment? I implore you to memorize Scripture.

It may feel like meddling, but I'm not trying to get under your skin; rather, I'm trying to get the Word into your heart like the Psalmist in today's verse.

Before you say you can't, repeat after me: Jesus wept. Golf clap. You just memorized John 11:35. Yes, I'm making light of what can be a daunting task for some. "No discipline seems pleasant at the time, but painful. Later on, however, it produces a harvest of righteousness and peace for those who have been trained by it" (Hebrews 12:11). Having a ready response for friends dealing with life issues deeper than a divot.
