Don't misunderstand; I love playing golf with others, but I also love playing alone. While it looks like I am playing alone, I am never alone. And since golf courses are some of the most beautiful places in the world, I recommend taking advantage of this experience whenever possible!

Last week, I went to my first significant tournament as a Senior Amateur player, and it was a different experience. I believe Bobby Jones said, "There's golf, and then there's tournament golf, and the two are not at all alike!" True enough.

Tournament golf has many distractions that can take over your mind if you let them. However, this tournament was different for me. It was important for me to shine the light of Christ while I played.

I made a conscious effort to ensure that I was a player with whom others would enjoy spending time and not just an overly competitive jerk like I had been many times in the past.

While my results were not what I hoped for, this time, I came away from the event feeling joyful and like I had accomplished something other than just trying to play good golf. I had tried to reach my playing partners in some way for Christ.

Time alone with God can give you great perspective and encouragement that will sustain you through other, more difficult times. I highly recommend this alternative way of spending time alone with God, playing golf with the one who never leaves us.

Now, as a friend of mine likes to say... "Go give' em Heaven today!"
